Our annual meeting is just around the corner, so we're bringing you an update on what's been going on.

Summer's in full swing on our lake. Even though we've survived the rush of the July 4th weekend, our daylight hours are still long and there's much of the summer left to enjoy.

While reports come in that other lake levels are down this year, our water is where it belongs, thanks our abundant springs.

We've seen fewer fishermen on the lake this year, owing to what seems to be a decline in big Northerns, lately. Some big ones are still being caught off piers. Most of them have been released, which is good for our lake.

On July 17th all five commissioners met to formulate our proposed 2008 budget and take care of a few other agenda items. It looks like our tax levy will be lower than last year, which is good news to everyone.

July 17th Meeting Notes

- Voted to publish our by-laws on the web site.
- Voted to dispense with our donation box at the boat landing.
- Discussed concerns with having our annual picnic at the "outlot" off Trout Road.
- Discussed getting a new design for the winter aerator lights that will meet DNR requirements.
- Confirmed Radley Watkins, Oneida Co. Invasive Species Coordinator, as our meeting speaker.
- Created our 2008 Proposed Budget; \$11,200 tax levy (17.3% lower than 2007).

Special Membership Meeting

Tim Hoyman, Aquatic Ecologist with Onterra Lake Management, using charts, slides, and graphs, made an excellent presentation to the fourteen residents who attended the meeting. He mapped out the entire process of studying the lake. Since success of the study relies on cooperation and participation of district residents,

Four residents volunteered to be on the Lake Grant Planning Committee. They are Kris Batchelet, Hans Delius, Mary Ellen Zickus, Jim Watters, & Pat Donnack.

There will be approx. four meetings with several important tasks for the leaders to accomplish together:

- ◆ develop and tally a survey
- ◆ coordinate with residents
- ◆ evaluate final results of the study
- ◆ discuss possible recommendations for lake policies



Weed Cutting

Weed cutting was done this year beginning July 14th by Cliff Schmidt of Schmidt's Landscaping, Iola, WI. Cliff was also contracted last year and did another excellent job.

Based on the abundance of weeds last year, we contracted for 80 hours of weed cutting rather than 54 hours.

For whatever reason, we had fewer weeds this year, and Cliff used only 40 hours but promised that if our weeds get out of control, he'd come back in August. We have the funds to cover more time, if needed.

Donation Box

Commissioners met with Steven Petersen of the DNR on April 2nd and worked out a new fifteen year lease to allow placement of the aerator in its' present location. The DNR dropped its' fee to \$1.00 and the District agreed to several conditions important to the DNR:

- 1) Removal of excess wood, rope, concrete blocks, buoys, and stakes from state land,
- 2) Removal of our donation box at the boat landing,
- 3) Different placement of our winter aerator lights.

District storage of equipment on state land was becoming an eyesore, so a different location will be used. Using Wisconsin lakes is free to all, no other lake had such a donation box, the box has become an attractive nuisance to vandals, and only a very small amount of money is actually collected. For these reasons the commissioners agreed to remove the box. At present vandals have destroyed the box.

The commissioners are asking that residents encourage non-District lake

users to make a voluntary donation by mail to our treasurer, Beverly Fagan, if they wish to contribute to our improvement efforts.


Revised Bylaws

Did you know?


One pound of phosphorous in lawn fertilizer can produce as much as 167 pounds of weeds? We all need to do our best to limit nutrients entering the lake.
